G. New Business

Seishin Karate proposals

A representative from Seishin Karate sent the following email to Margaret:

If you recall, we had decent success with the donation program before. As a reminder, we provided that library with bookmarks featuring our logo, and a special for new students. For every new student that signed up using that bookmark (or referenced it) we donated \$100 to the Medway library. We ended up raising several hundred dollars...and while it was nice to continue to grow our school, it was even more rewarding knowing we were helping our local library.

Second, we are also currently putting together an anti-bullying campaign that will feature free seminars for the community. While this program is still being developed, once its completed (spring 2018) we also would look to see if the you would be interested in hosting a community anti-bulling event run by Seishin.

Should we allow this karate school to advertise with bookmarks? We had a brief discussion on this topic. A few questions arose that can be better answered by Margaret. Therefore, we will continue this discussion at the next meeting when Margaret is present.

Water fountains

From Margaret: "consider installing a drinking fountain similar to the one at Town Hall..."

We need more specifics on these fountains from Margaret. We will discuss next month.

Proposal from Diane Busa

Diane Busa distributed an email requesting that some of the funds received from Commcan Inc. be used to purchase equipment for the craft side of the Makerspace. The content of her email is as follows:

With the recent allocation of \$10K to the Library from the proceeds of a host-community agreement with a medical marijuana growing facility in town, I would like to propose the following:

As you know, the craft side of the Makerspace has no outside access to funds, whereas Medway Cable Access generously supports the technology side, as seen with the recent purchase of the large format printer. I would like some of the 10K to be used for equipment that is considered "craft" items so that we can run in-house programs.

I am specifically thinking of a Silhouette Cameo 3 vinyl cutter and a new laptop to connect to it. This [device] has been discussed by the Trustees as something worth exploring. I recently took part in a mini-tutorial/demo of the Cameo 3. Fortunately, we have a patron who is well versed in using it. This vinyl cutter is very versatile and I believe we can offer school-age and teen programs for card making, scrapbooking, t-shirt designing, & glass etching, just to name a few. There are multiple websites and blogs that are full of ideas.

I know that funds from other accounts can be used but I think it is important to set a precedent for this matter. The town is recommending that the 10K is used to fund youth programs. I believe this should also mean to purchase the equipment to host programs since we would be able to create a balance between hiring outside artists/performers and holding our own youth programs run by our youth services staff.

Many of the surrounding libraries already do this, Medfield is an example. With the proper equipment, Medway can also accomplish this. According to Mike Boynton in the Feb 20 Milford Daily News article, "the funds would be provided to the given departments, but not necessarily directed to be used for a specific use". I should hope that the town accountant would approve the use of this money for equipment and any other future purchases to enhance the Makerspace and allow for more workshops that would draw in the youth of Medway, such as a button maker machine (1.25 in) and a t-shirt heat press. It would be nice to give teens, elementary age children, and families a safe place to explore their creative side. Now that the Makerspace is approaching its 2 year anniversary, it is time to see what else we can offer in the space.

I estimate the cost for the machine and tools to be around \$300 and the cost of a laptop fast enough to handle the Silhouette software to be \$300 as well.

This program could begin in the fall. The Library would have events and activities for all ages designed around this book. The planning is ongoing.

 Diane noticed slide converters, vhs/dvd converters, 8 mm converter, sewing machines and 3D printer all being used by patrons as well as soldering iron & smaller hand tools.

<u>Issues:</u>

Need to take an assessment of the computers to see if they are adequate for some of the things we want to start doing in the space.

Other:

- Large format printer has arrived! Thank you Medway Cable Access! I will work on setting it up and find a place for it.
- Diane saw a demonstration for the Silhouette Cameo 3 vinyl cutter. Very impressed with it.
- Trip to the Recycling center in RI with Lucy was postponed and is rescheduled for March 15.

• Two of our regular visitors to the makerspace would like to teach a "Blender" class. Blender is a free and open-source 3D computer graphics *software* toolset used for creating animated films, visual effects, art, 3D printed models, interactive 3D applications and video games. One is already CORI'd because he will also be certifying people on the 3D printer twice per month. We will work on developing this starting in June.

Children's/YA Librarian Report (Lucy Anderson):

There were 21 children's programs in February with 222 people attending (adults and children). 1 Teen program had 2 attendees.

The total spent so far this fiscal year for books and materials is \$13263.78.

Lucy attended a wellness committee meeting. I've started planning for April vacation and Summer Reading.

Lucy has weeded the Board Books and is in the process of weeding YA fiction.

Technology

The Medway Library is going to be a test case for a soon to be released free wildcard SSL certificate that Minuteman Library Network staff will test out. If this works, we will

not have to buy an SSL certificate at a cost of about \$200 in order for some of the databases to which we subscribe with remote access to work properly. Currently, although access is possible, an error message appears that makes it look as if there is a security issue.

Building

Bobby McGee obtained estimates for replacing the roof that were much higher than the amount received at the last Annual Town Meeting. We may only be able to replace the shingles, but not the flat part of the roof, at this time. Replacing the flat surface will not require lifting the roof top heating units (RTUs), fortunately, so we can avoid the cost of a crane.

Bobby is going to contact the Lighting Engineer again. Projects to be paid from the remaining carpet money must commence in FY18. There are also several "flat headed lights" near the playground at Choate Park that they are going to remove. These could be inexpensively repurposed at the Library we decide they are appropriate.

DPS and an energy specialist toured the library. I shared the issues we have been having with the computerized heating controls, and he spent quite a bit of time looking at the program.

It appears that a belt may be loose on one of the RTUs.

Other

After the tragedy at the Winchester Public Library, I contacted the Medway Police and the Town Administrator to ask for suggestions concerning improving safety. An officer came by to see the layout of the library, and another officer came by the next day and

said they would be dropping by regularly. I met with Chief Tingley and Lt. Kingsbury to discuss possible safety improvements and training.

During February, the lower level community space was used after hours for 14 meetings and 41 individuals during the 15 nights it was open. The Makerspace visitor count was 145, which is probably an underestimate because people do not always remember to sign in.
