Adult Craft Class: Snowman Ornaments at the Nashua Library

The Nashua Library holds monthly Zoom craft classes for adults. Participants pick up materials for the craft at the library, and register for the Zoom class, where we chat and make the craft together. In November, we made simple, cute snowman ornaments using wooden beads, baker's twine, and paint. Eight people attended the Zoom class,

while an additional 42 people picked up the materials to make the craft on their own at home!

We generally have the same 5 or 6 people in each Zoom class. The November class had the highest attendance so far, which was nice. I think the social aspect of the class is the main draw, since so many people feel isolated and lonely being stuck at home during the pandemic. Even when the craft is a very simple one, we have a good time chatting about books, hobbies, our pandemic pastimes, etc. I know I get a nice boost from the time I spend with the class participants, and I think they do too!

One of the big challenges has been finding craft ideas that are engaging, fun, simple without being TOO simple, and don't require participants to have access to tools like hot-glue guns, pliers, spray paint, etc. The technology aspect is a challenge, too -- we know that there are many folks who aren't confident using Zoom, or don't have access to a computer or a stable internet connection, so they can't join us for the class. Hopefully, providing the materials and instructions for those folks to make the craft on their own is helpful for them. In the meantime, we're all looking forward to being able to have the craft classes in person again in the future.



Political Fact-Checking Resources

Many of us find ourselves fielding questions from patrons, not to mention each other, about what the current election controversy means for the presidential transfer of power

and potential POTUS initiated court proceedings. It can be difficult to find reliable, comprehensive, and unbiased resources for these sorts of political and legal queries. The ALA's 'Evaluating Information' LibGuide is a wealth of links to fact-checking websites and programming content that can help you provide patrons with accurate nonpartisan information:

Historical content includes debates, speeches, rallies, and more. You also have the ability to create custom video clips and share them with others.

Politwoops

Politwoops displays tweets that have been published and since deleted by local and national U.S. politicians and presidential candidates. A product of the nonpartisan Sunlight Foundation, Politwoops follows members of the House and Senate from both political parties.
